From the Pastor's Desk...

Friends,

It's that time again—Epiphany Star Words! We get a star each year on Epiphany, the day the Wise Ones brought gifts to young Jesus after following his star in the sky. The star has a word on it that is ours to follow throughout the year, allowing the Holy Spirit to help illuminate the meaning of that particular word in our life.

In 2021, I got two stars—one from FPCRO and one from my husband's church, Jefferson Avenue Presbyterian Church. His church went with the Scrabble words, it seems, as I got a word I'd never heard before and had to look it up. The word was "balter," and in case you didn't know either, it means to dance or tread clumsily. And it was the exact word I needed for 2021!



That definition feels like a perfect description of my year. At home, we tried to make it through another year of Covid precautions and intermittent school closures. At church, we tried to create worship and programming that was safe and meaningful yet still creative. It felt like forward steps, occasional triumphs, and a lot of clumsiness. Because mid-pandemic, we still don't know exactly how to be, how to plan, and how to envision the future. And yet, I am glad I got to balter through the year! Because I don't want to just stumble around. I want to dance, even if it does look a little clumsy. I'm reminded of the poem by Alice Walker, "Hard Times Require Furious Dancing." That feels true to me.


How did your word carry you through 2021? What felt true about it to you, by the end of the year? What parts of it never resonated? Where do you hope to be led in the new year?

It feels like yesterday we stood at this precipice looking ahead to 2021 and hoping and praying it would be so much better than 2020! I don't know if that worked out exactly as we'd planned. As we march in 2022, I think we might be better off giving thanks for each day as it is, hoping not for glorious days but for *good enough* days, lived in the sight of God's mercy. I doubt I'll ever draw the world "balter" as an Epiphany star word again, but I might keep it in mind as I continue to tread forward into the unknown future, seeking to dance—no matter how clumsy I may be!

Mission & Benevolence

MISSION GRANT

In the fall of 2021, a friend of FPCRO offered the church a mission grant of \$25,000. The donor seeks to put their resources into God's service in unique ways. They believe our congregation can be a partner in serving the world God loves so much. What a gift of generosity and a deep vote of trust in our congregation! A team of elders put together a plan to use the grant funds, which is centered around the scripture from Isaiah 58:6-10. The following three projects emerged from that text and are ones our congregation seeks to implement in 2022.

Centering Scripture: Isaiah 58:6-10

6 Is not this the fast that I choose:
to loose the bonds of injustice,
to undo the thongs of the yoke,
to let the oppressed go free,
and to break every yoke?
7 Is it not to share your bread with the hungry,
and bring the homeless poor into your house;
when you see the naked, to cover them,
and not to hide yourself from your own kin?
8 Then your light shall break forth like the dawn,
and your healing shall spring up quickly;

your vindicator shall go before you,
the glory of the Lord shall be your rearguard.

Then you shall call, and the Lord will answer;
you shall cry for help, and he will say, Here I am.
If you remove the yoke from among you,
the pointing of the finger, the speaking of evil,

the you offer your food to the hungry
and satisfy the needs of the afflicted,
then your light shall rise in the darkness
and your gloom be like the noonday.

This passage encompasses what God most desires from the faithful. God does not desire a fast from food or a particular type of worship, but rather actions to help neighbors; deeds that demonstrate our trust in God's love and compassion. Such actions include working for justice and freedom for those who are oppressed; helping the poorest who are homeless and hungry; and sharing hospitality especially with those who are vulnerable. When we do these things, we notice God's light breaking into the darkness and God's presence being made known.

PROGRAMS FOR 2022

- **\$7,000 Refugee Resettlement:** In partnership with Samaritas, co-sponsor a family who is resettling in the United States. Funds will be used to cover rent in the early months of their arrival, and for possible additional expenses such as furniture, winter clothing, or other needs as identified by the family.
- **\$8,000 Children's Library Ministry:** Transform an appropriate space in the church into an outreach for children and families with a selection of high-quality books (theological/Biblical titles as well as high quality story books), welcoming furnishings for young children and parents, and other activities designed to draw the community into our orbit as a safe and welcoming location.
- \$10,000 South Oakland Citizens for the Homeless, given through Starr Presbyterian Church: To boost the efforts of the Welcome Home program (currently launching), which seeks to transition appropriate guests into



permanent housing and offer support and life skills they need as they embrace a new lifestyle, we will direct \$6,000 to support 25% of a 12 month contract for the social worker at the helm of the program. As part of our efforts to become more involved in hands-on ministry with SOCH, we will direct \$4,000 toward the installation of a laundry facility inside Starr's building to help homeless guests learn this important skill.

If you are interested in being involved in refugee resettlement, installing a children's library space for the public inside our church, or helping us create a fresh partnership with Welcome Home, be in touch with Pastor Emma at **enickel@fpcro.org** or by phone at the church. She will help you get connected and ready to serve! We would love to have your involvement.

FPCRO practices the values from this parable through our Mission & Benevolence donations and various mission and H.O.M.E. projects. However, were you aware, we're able to help immediate needs of congregation and community members through our Pastor's Discretionary Benevolence Fund? This fund allows Pastor Emma to give real-time help in the way of grocery store cards, paying rent or utilities, filling a gas tank, or providing items to solve the most current need. Our Mission & Benevolence Committee partially funds the account, the rest of the gifts are direct donations by FPCRO family and friends. In the past 18 months, there has been an increased need for these funds and we expect this to continue with the weather turning colder. As a result, this fund could use replenishing. If you are able and so called to respond, your donations can help us continue to meet the needs of our church family and community. Donations can be mailed to the church, put in the offering plate on Sunday, or made online. Please note Pastor's Discretionary Benevolence on the memo line of the check or in the special instructions in PayPal.

Stewardship

There is an ironic twist to serve on the Stewardship committee when the theme for the annual campaign is "Deep Water." I do not swim well, and am afraid of being in water over my head (and I am a fairly short woman). What does it mean to go deep? To have faith the deep water of life will not overwhelm, and God will provide everlasting water that refreshes and provides our needs.

A personal example came from a FPCRO youth mission trip in the early 2000s near Ozone, TN. We spent an afternoon at the

local swimming hole and I got a little too close to the edge. My only recourse was to jump in! Thankfully the Cone and Moultrup boys were there to catch me, tow me to shore, and drag my shaking body up the bank.

God provides for us too (well, maybe not always using the Moultrup and Cone kids). When life is scary, when doubts

appear, when we question decisions—God is there. We don't fear the water, but instead can draw on its life-giving properties. Our church provides similar assurance, support, life-enriching growth, and fellowship. With God's promises, we can dig down and give deep; giving of time, talents, and our financial support. God's gift of life-

sustaining water is a promise. I encourage you to consider digging just a bit deeper this year with the assurance that we will not drown.

Look for your Deeper Well stewardship packet in the mail the first week of February. Notify the church office if you don't receive it. You're invited to prayerfully consider your giving and then return your pledge card to the church on or before Sunday, February 27.



Pandemic Response Team Update

The Pandemic Response Team (PRT) continues to meet monthly to review current data and information as it relates to COVID-19 in our area. We are always ready to adjust our protocols and policies as conditions allow and as local and national health agencies suggest. At this time, we continue to believe FPCRO's protocols are in line with the best recommendations for health and safety. We continue to require masking in the building and have the sanctuary windows open for worship services to improve ventilation. We are not yet ready to allow for eating inside the building, since it requires mask removal. We urge members to always remain at home when feeling ill, even with conditions that, years ago, we might have simply 'pushed through' to attend worship or other activities. The PRT's recommendations are meant to protect the vulnerable, especially those at each end of the age spectrum and those with particular conditions that make them more susceptible to the virus.

We are celebrating, along with many FPCRO families, a number of our 5-11 year-old members who have been able to get vaccinated in the past month and with all those adults getting booster shots! We look forward to improving conditions in the new year and will continue to monitor the situation and adjust our recommendations as appropriate.
