# Compassion O

The root word literally means "suffering with" and then taking action that benefits each other in the community as a whole. This is the kind of mutual care evoked by Jesus' call to "Love your neighbor as yourself."

When we gather, when we get to know each other, and when we take care of one other, that's compassion in action, too. It's the simple, beautiful work of empathy—reaching around the world or down the block.

We partner with the Presbytery of Detroit to collect Cereal for Summer, giving kids access to easy meals at home when school is out of session.








Rise Against Hunger helps ensure that all God's children have enough to eat.

















### Community. Compassion. Justice and love


