It's tradition in our November *Church Bell* for me to offer you a way to give thanks throughout the month. This year, I'm offering the *ABC's of Gratitude*, which were compiled by Jo Nygard Owens of Vibrant Communications for the Church. Note that a few letters appear twice so there are words and questions for each of the 30 days of November. Print out this page and answer or pray about the daily question for a short, but meaningful, spiritual practice. Or, check out the church's page on Facebook or Instagram each day for a definition of each word, a quote, and a Bible verse relating to it. You can journal your thoughts, just ponder them over coffee, or share some responses to the questions on social media throughout the month.

It can sometimes feel hard to work spiritual practices into our real, actual lives. Rather than feeling frustrated about that, I invite you to give this practice a try. It's a simple way to connect with God and your Spirit during this month of thanksgiving. C is for Community. I am thankful for our community and especially for you being part of it.

A is for Abundance: Where do you find abundance and how do you give thanks for it?

B is for Beauty: How does appreciation help you see more beauty?

C is for Community: Where do you find true community that enriches your life?

C is for Creation: How does your gratitude for creation change how you interact?

D is for Discern: When were you grateful that discernment led to an unexpected direction?

E is for Empathy: How does empathy change your heart and mind?

F is for Forgive: How can forgiveness bring gratitude to your life?

G is for Generous: How does generosity lead to gratitude?

H is for Healing: When can gratitude be a part of healing?

I is for Imagination: How can imagination change a situation for the better?

J is for Joy: Does thankfulness lead to joy or joy to thankfulness? Why do you think that is?

J is for Justice: When have you seen justice enacted and been thankful?

K is for Known: When have you felt truly known? Give thanks for that time.

L is for Laughter: When were you particularly thankful for a good laugh?

M is for Music: What music helps you express your gratitude?

M is for Meaning: What simple thing in your life brings much meaning and gratitude?

N is for Neighbor: How does our interconnected world expand who our neighbors are?

O is for Observe: Take note throughout your day - how many things can you be thankful for?

P is for Present: When you stay in the present moment, how do things change?

Q is for Questions: What questions lead you to deeper understanding? Give thanks for growth!

R is for Renew: Where is renewal needed in your life? How can gratitude play a part?

R is for Risk: What was a time you took a leap of faith and you were grateful you did?

S is for Stillness: Make room for stillness in your day and name what you are thankful for.

T is for Time: What do you give thanks for at this time in your life?

U is for Understanding: When has understanding led to gratitude for you?

V is for Vocation: What gifts are you thankful to be able to share?

W is for Welcome: When were you thankful for being welcomed? How can you welcome?

X is for eXample: Whose example are you thankful for? Can you tell them?

Y is for Youth: What are you thankful for from your youth? How is it still part of your life?

Z is for Zeal: How can your gratitude inspire you to bring your whole self to all you do?

ADVENT BEGINS NOVEMBER 27



Congregational News

There are people in the building! We said those words several times at a recent staff meeting as we were coordinating events and meetings. This fall, we have seen many of our activities and outside groups have more people opting to participate in-person. It is great to see the hallways full again on a regular basis. We wanted to highlight a couple of new groups that will be around the building in November, the **Sportsman's Dog Training Club** and **Nacho Grill Food Truck**.

Sportsman's Dog Training Club

was founded in 1942 and is proud to be Michigan's Oldest Dog Training Club. They help train dogs to be a well-mannered companion, compete in obedience or rally, strut in the confirmation ring, or fly through an agility course. They will be hosting an AKC Scent Work Trial at First Presbyterian Church of Royal Oak on **November 19 and 20**.



Sportsman's will be using our entire building on Saturday and Sunday for scent trials except the worship wing starting at the reception desk and extending through the sanctuary and the nursery. **During their rental on November 19 and November 20, we are asking that you please:**

- Enter the building through the Chapel or Hendrie doors. We will have the sandwich board signs out as reminders.
- Remain in this section of the building as much as possible. The rest rooms will be open. If you are able, please use the ones at the top of the stairs in the CE Lobby.
- The dogs are being timed, please don't interact with them in any way.

The American Kennel Club explains scent trials on their website AKC Scent Work—American Kennel Club below:

Fascinating fact: Dogs have a sense of smell that's between 10,000 and 100,000 times more acute than ours! The sport of Scent Work celebrates the joy of sniffing, and asks a dog to sniff to their heart's content; turning your dog's favorite activity into a rewarding game. It is a terrific sport for all kinds of dogs, and is a wonderful way to build confidence in a shy dog.

In so many dog sports the handler is in control but this isn't true in Scent Work. Neither the dog nor handler knows where the target odor is hidden. The handler has to rely on the dog, and follow the dog's nose to success. In Scent Work, it is the canine who is the star of the show.

The sport of Scent Work is based on the work of professional detection dogs (such as drug dogs), employed by humans to detect a wide variety of scents and substances. In AKC Scent Work, dogs search for cotton swabs saturated with the essential oils of Birch, Anise, Clove, and Cypress. The cotton swabs are hidden out of sight in a pre-determined search area, and the dog has to find them. Teamwork is necessary: when the dog finds the scent, he has to communicate the find to the handler, who calls it out to the judge.

Nacho Grill: Lynette Rogers and Omar Raines will be regular faces in our building as they are the newest renters of our commercial kitchen. They have been in business for about two years and are now the owners of the **Nacho Grill Food Truck**. The truck made its inaugural debut at Arts, Beats, and Eats and Dequindre Cut this fall. Lynnette jokes about choosing the two biggest festivals in the Metro area as their firsts, as learning to swim for the first time in the middle of the Atlantic Ocean. But they learned a lot and both were successful events. They were grateful for the use of our facility as they did the majority of the prep for these events in KFH Kitchen.



Prior to purchasing the truck, they were doing corporate lunch services for the past 18 months. They come in and setup in under 30 minutes and feed 100-300 people during the lunch-time hours. They started small but their customers now include Amazon, Beaumont, Henry Ford, and Chrysler.

Lynnette worked in recruiting and Omar owned a print and advertising company in Ferndale. They consider themselves ultimate foodies and enjoy the pleasure of a great eating experience. They were constantly asking themselves what they liked most about the cuisine they had just enjoyed, and what they could have done better. Since the curiosity and spark to enter the market was already there, they just took the leap of faith. We welcome them and wish them success.

Sharing the Kitchen

- Nacho Grill will have an event calendar posted on the whiteboard in the kitchen so we know when to expect them in the building.
- We will share with them the dates the church needs use of the kitchen.
- They will have a labeled shelving unit assigned to them to store their dry goods in the storage area.
- They will be allotted use of half of the refrigerator which will be labeled.
- All persons using the kitchen will need to make sure everything is cleaned and put away at the end of their event to leave the space ready for the next group.


