

*From the Pastor's Desk...*

Friends,

Summer is coming! I have finally come to terms with the fact that, here in Michigan, I have just three months to wear summer clothes and take walks outside (at a temperature I find enjoyable, at least!) So I am planning to fully savor playground time, trips to the splash pad, sunshine, evenings on the porch, grilled food, and picking fresh kale and lettuce from the garden all summer.

This month is full of important Sunday activities at the church. Our new **summer worship schedule of a single service at 10 am each Sunday begins on June 18 and runs through Labor Day weekend**. On the third Sunday of June, July, and August, we will worship outside on the Hendrie Lawn, weather permitting.

- **Sunday, June 4 at 10:30 am** — We celebrate our confirmation students in worship as they affirm their faith in Christ.
- **Sunday, June 11 at 10:30 am** — The choir leads us in worship for a Global Hymn Fest of anthems and songs that help us understand the fullness of God through other languages and cultures.
- **Sunday, June 18 at 10:00 am, worship outside on the Hendrie Lawn** – New members will join the church and we will celebrate with them on this day.
- **Sunday, June 25 at 10:00 am** — Elders and deacons who are entering a new term of service will be ordained and installed during worship.

Summer can get busy as we try to pack in all our favorite activities. But God also urges us to rest and renew. Our church is taking a **July Sabbath** this year. I hope you'll join me, the church leaders, and staff in this experiment.

- **What does it mean to have a July Sabbath?** During July, we will focus on having meaningful worship each Sunday at 10 am. But we won't have much other programming. Our committees and boards will not meet. You won't see other activities scheduled on the calendar.
- **Why are we taking a sabbath month?** This has been our busiest year yet since the pandemic closure of 2020. We embraced the ability to be together, to sing, to do mission projects and come to events at the church. But in those pandemic days, we all promised ourselves that we wouldn't return to the normal hustle and bustle of life as we had known it. That's been a hard promise to keep. Yet an intentional time of rest in our congregation can help us renew our energy and have space to reflect on where we've been, as well as where we're headed. (We also have a lot planned for the fall!)
- **What is the spiritual meaning of a sabbath?** The fourth commandment is "Remember the Sabbath." Today, most Christians follow this commandment by taking time to rest, setting work aside—even when it's not done yet—and enjoying the life God has given us. Doing this reminds us that everything does not rely on us. Working harder is not the solution to life. God is always in control, regardless of what we do or don't do. This letting go, caring for our spirits, and focusing on God is a way to nourish our discipleship and strengthen our faith.

I hope the church's July Sabbath will invite you into some intentional sabbath-keeping in your own life, too. Let it be an invitation to say no to some things and yes to the goodness God offers.

# Mission and Benevolence

The Mission & Benevolence Committee would like to share with the congregation how our budgeted funds were used and some of the Hands-On Mission activities and collections we sponsored this fiscal year.

The Committee continued to focus on the impact giving areas of **home, health, and hunger**. Donations made on behalf of the congregation were: \$4,000 to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (to help disaster survivors in the United States and around the world); \$3,000 to the Arab-American Chaldean Council (which supports Middle East and other communities, including Refugees, in Southeast Michigan, and has helped our church support the Afghan family); \$2,000 each to Lighthouse and Shared Mission for Presbytery (a way to support local missions throughout our Presbytery that are not funded through Per Capita gifts); and \$1,000 each to Forgotten Harvest, Gleaners, Open Hands Food Pantry, and Westminster Church of Detroit for their Thanksgiving dinner programs.

Hands-On sponsored events included the CROP Walk, Days for Girls, providing a meal for the South Oakland Warming Shelter, Song and Spirit's SnackPax program, and plarn making for Song and Spirit. Items were collected for Common Ground (now part of Lighthouse), Cereal for Summer (sponsored by the Presbytery of Detroit), FPCRO's Little Free Pantry, the Salvation Army's Angel Tree program, the Mitten Tree, and Operation Paperback.

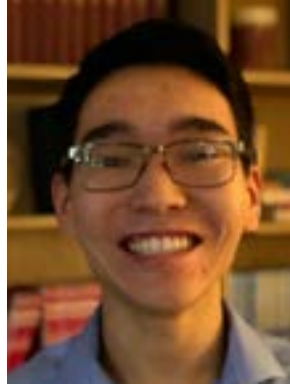

# Global Hymn Festival

**O**n **Sunday, June 11**, the Music Department will lead us in a worship service based on music from many cultures and countries around the world. With the state of our country and our world, we need things that bring us together and bridge the divide that so many feel. Through the music of this service, we will strive to show the connection we have to the Global Church, and how, even though we may worship differently, we make music in praise of one God.

The Jubilate Bell Choir will begin the service with a lovely setting of a Brazilian hymn based on Psalm 98 "O Sing to the Lord a New Song." The Chancel Choir will begin with an Introit sung by women in Cameroon, West Africa calling us all to "Praise God's Holy name. Alleluia!" This processional song is accompanied by drums and our Sunburst Singers will demonstrate the traditional procession steps that accompany it.

As a response to the Assurance of Pardon, the Chancel Choir will sing a South African hymn calling us to testify to God's saving grace in the world. Soloists portray the roles of religious leaders calling us to testify.

The Sunburst Singers will share a beautiful anthem, which tells us we are more than neighbors, we are family. This piece incorporates the familiar Sunday School Song "Jesus Loves the Little Children."

As a response to the first scripture, the Chancel Choir will sing the Hebrew maxim "Al Shloscha D'Varim," which translates as *"The world is sustained by three things, by truth, by justice, and by peace."*

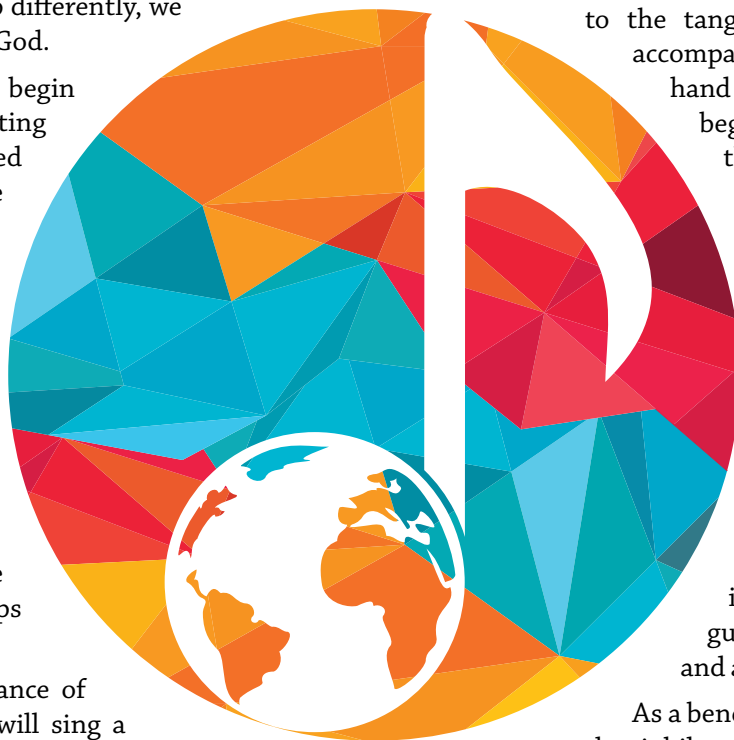
In response to the second scripture, we will hear a beautiful Japanese tune patterned after the ancient gagaku music of the imperial court of China dating back to the tang dynasty. This lovely piece, accompanied by flute, percussion and hand bells, tells the story of the beginning of the Church when the Spirit descended on the twelve disciples.

As an offertory, the choir sings an exceptionally beautiful Latin American setting of the text from Matthew, "where two or three are gathered in My name, there will I be also."

We will be called to prayer by a bhajan from North India. This song invites us into prayer as we seek God's guidance and leading in our lives and as we pray for the entire world.

As a benediction response, we will hear the jubilant "Hands are Knockin." This piece comes from the Middle East, and with the juxtaposition of English and Arabic texts is intended to reinforce the universality of the message: an invitation to open our minds, hearts, and hands to each other.

We hope that your faith and understanding of the world will be enhanced and enriched through this service.

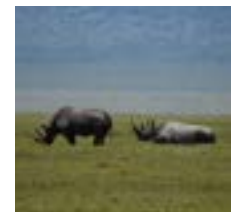
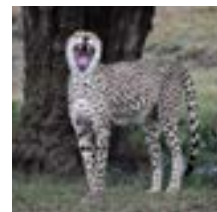

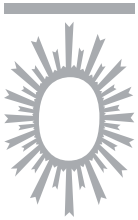
