From the Pastor's Desk...

Siblings in love,

Did you rest well this summer? Were you able to find a rhythm of sabbath, or at least some moments of it? What joys or discoveries marked this season? What sorrows unexpectedly showed up? I hope you can bring all those experiences with you as we gather for the fall.

This is always a season that feels like a fresh start to me. As we head into it, I want to share with you where our church is headed for the fall. In worship this year, we are going to be reading a different set of scriptures called the Narrative Lectionary. A lectionary is just a cycle of particular Bible passages that are laid out to be read on certain days. The Narrative Lectionary takes us on a journey through the *whole Bible*, mostly in chronological order, in one year.


- In September, we'll start with creation in Genesis.
- The fall will lead us through God's covenant and many of the prophets, who proclaim God's hope.
- In Advent, we'll take a journey in Luke to hear all the parts of the story leading up to Jesus' birth and the fulfillment of that hope.
- From January through Lent, we'll read stories of Jesus' ministry all in the gospel of Mark.
- Then after Jesus' death and resurrection at Easter, we will hear how the early church started living out their hope in Jesus through the book of Acts and other letters, or epistles (1 Corinthians, 1 Thessalonians).

The children's Sunday school classes will be reading the same scripture passages that we will hear in worship each week. We hope this can spark conversation in families about what each member has heard and learned. Pastor Neeta will be leading a short study of the Old Testament during October, which will be another way to learn more about the stories we're hearing in worship each week. There will also be a visual element in the sanctuary that ties in with the scripture passage each week.

The goal is to help us better understand the overall story, or arc, of the Bible. When we hear the story in order, over the course of the year, we can better grasp what God's promises mean and how salvation in Christ came about. These readings allow us to go deeply into the story and to see how one event sets up the next one. This context can help us when we hear other passages in future Bible study or worship experiences because we will have a sense of the bigger story. All of that helps us to see our own stories reflected in scripture so that we can focus on God's activity in our lives today.

This fall, we also have the joy of welcoming a **seminary intern** to our congregation. Lon Kuehn is a candidate for ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament in the Presbyterian Church (USA) through our local Presbytery of Detroit. Which means he's training to become a pastor. He will complete his Master of Divinity degree in the spring and will first spend the fall learning and serving in our congregation for a few hours each week. You'll see Lon leading worship, attending Bible study, participating in Sunday school and other activities. Please introduce yourself (wear your name tag!), and welcome him to our church!

FLU SHOTS AFTER WORSHIP SEPT 10



NEW COMMITTEE STRUCTURE

Our church has implemented a new structure for our committees, which we are living into this fall. Last year, a task force of the Session determined that our previous structure with nine committees, plus Session and Deacons, was a bit unwieldy. Also, elders were asked to serve on two committees, in addition to their time on Session. The task force proposed a structure with just six committees, which was approved by the Session for implementation in August 2023. This format allows for two elders on each

committee, along with one or more deacons and additional at-large members.

Several of our previous committees have combined to create new ways of planning and executing our ministries.

Though the Evangelism and Communication Committee has been eliminated, its goals of outreach and communication to the wider community are being lodged in each individual committee, and with the staff. We value sharing all that we are doing and want each of our leaders to take this work seriously. Below is the new committee structure.

Nominating—Responsible for calling forth people in the congregation with gifts to serve on Session, Deacons, and as at-large members of the Nominating Committee. **Robin Hanks, Chair**

Mission in Service—Responsible for creating opportunities for the congregation to serve our neighbors, both in the community and through events at church. Oversees the church's mission budget, which may be given to support organizations in the community or the church's mission projects. **Karen Thomas, Chair**

House and Grounds—Responsible for maintenance, upkeep, and repairs to the church's building and grounds. Manages contracts and works closely with the Facilities Manager. **Derek Helenberger, Chair**

Worship and Nurture—Responsible for the congregation's worship life and spiritual growth, including music ministries, and education for all ages. This committee encompasses the previous ministry of the Worship & Music and Christian Education Committees. Julie Matthews, Chair

Generosity and Resources—

Responsible for the financial health and stewardship of the church. Plans the annual giving campaign, including activities, worship, and sharing gratitude with the congregation. Prepares the operating budget, oversees

the church's investments, and participates in an annual financial review. This committee encompasses the previous ministries of the Stewardship and Finance and Investment Committees. *Karen Kline and Anne-Marie DeVantier, Co-Chairs*

Personnel—Responsible for ministering to the church's staff through decisions related to compensation, staffing levels, and the staff members' well-being. **Kevin Schnieders, Chair**



Their team delivers 144,000 pounds of surplus food per day to local charities.

On the Rise Bakery and R.O.P.E. (Reaching Our Potential Everyday) are two of the many programs of the Capuchin Soup Kitchen. The R.O.P.E. Program provides men who have been incarcerated or completed a Substance Use Disorder Program a way to "re-enter" society by training them in baking skills. The extended residential program offers the opportunity for them to develop abilities that will solidify their sobriety, further their education, and hone their life skills.



Sunflowers Christian Preschool



We begin. The teachers have been anticipating the arrival of our wonderful little preschoolers, and have been very busy preparing and organizing a safe and loving environment. The school year begins on Tuesday, September 5, where our three-years-olds will be accompanied by one parent on this first day. We will introduce ourselves, the classroom, and share what each and every day of school looks like. Our four-year-old class will begin independently on Wednesday, September 6. We have three new four-year-olds joining us this year and 13 returning friends from last year.

September always brings new friends to learn about or reacquaint with, classroom rules to remember, and lots of enthusiasm and excitement for new routines. The children come with wide eyes, hopefully not too many tears, and an eagerness to meet new friends, play and to learn, and make lots of wonderful memories. Both classes will focus on fall themes, including apples and the color red. You might even smell something delicious coming from our room when we cook with apples! We will also start our Bible study right at the very beginning with the creation story.


The four-year-old class will begin studying the letters of the alphabet and begin to learn about word families. Our three-year-olds will start counting the very first day as we count the days we are in school each month. All the children will be busy each day developing their fine motor skills in many ways. EAGLE SCOUT SERVICE PROJECT

An Eagle Scout Service Project, led by Aiden Davis, Boy Scout Troop 1629, was to clean and refurbish FPCRO's garage. His project cleared, cleaned, sorted, donated, recycled, re-purposed, and scrapped items in the garage. At the start of the project, the garage was packed so full there was no room to move around and much of the content was decades old. For instance, signs for a rummage sale were dated 1999!



logged. In that time, the entire garage was emptied out and the floors were power washed. Items inside were sorted under the supervision of Alan Glasel and Kari Peruski. Items that could be recycled were, and the remainder that couldn't be recycled were disposed. Two new walls, with shelves between the garage door bays, were built utilizing wood that had been stored in the garage. A work table was added along the back wall, and new hooks



for tools, rakes, and brooms were installed. During heavy rains, water can seep into the garage, so the lowest shelves were built 4-6" off the ground to ensure stored items remain dry.

Aiden raised and spent about \$650 on materials and supplies for the project and FPCRO supplied the dumpsters. Two 20-yard dumpsters were filled! We are grateful Aiden chose to benefit FPCRO with this Eagle Scout Project. His project has been approved by the Boy Scout Council and he will be awarded his Eagle Scout Badge in November. FPCRO is the

his Eagle Scout Badge in November. FPCRO is the chartering organization for Troop 1629, with Chris Allen as Scoutmaster and Kevin Kline serving as Troop Committee Chair and Institutional Representative.







Annual Notice to Electronic Givers

We thank you for your continued support to FPCRO. Approximately 37% of our pledging congregation and 38% of all pledge dollars (roughly \$206,308) will come through electronic giving during 2023-24. Thank you!

A few points to remember:

- At the start of this new fiscal year, your gift will continue to be deducted in the same manner as requested on your ACH request form.
- If you turned in a pledge card, the new amount will be reflected starting the withdrawal after August 1.
- If you didn't turn in a new pledge card, the amount will remain the same as the ACH Request form or the last pledge card received, including your *per capita* payment preference.

- Per Capita payments, if you so authorized, will be taken in your first withdrawal in September.
- Special gifts options, if you so authorized, will be taken in your first withdrawal in the month of selected holiday.
- If your chosen withdrawal date lands on a weekend or banking holiday, your gift will be withdrawn on the **preceding day**.
- You may change, suspend, or terminate your electronic giving option by giving seven-day advance written notice to the church administrator.

Tiny Homes—Cass Community Social Services

For the past two years, our church has received a generous grant from an anonymous giver to do mission in our community. For 2023, the grant was over \$32,000. The Session proposed a plan to use those funds to assist some of our hands-on mission projects, including the Snack Pax project and the Good Book Nook, last year. We also planned to support some new projects with these funds that have a broad reach in our community. Ten thousand dollars was dedicated to support the building of a portion of one Tiny Home in the Tiny Homes community in Detroit, built by

Cass Community Social Services (CCSS). In July, Pastor Emma and four members of Session visited CCSS and received a tour of the Tiny Homes community, including current homes and the location of the next phase.

At the moment, the Tiny Homes community consists of 25 tiny houses just off the Lodge Freeway near Elmhurst. Each Tiny Home is between 250-400 sq. ft. and has a unique exterior façade and interior footprint, making them as unique as the residents that live in them. The residents have qualified as low-income for the Tiny Homes. Many were once homeless, incarcerated, aged out of the foster care system, and /or senior citizens.

For the Tiny Homes residents, they initially rent their homes on an annual basis. Those who remain in their house and the program for seven years earn the opportunity to own their homes and build wealth associated with home ownership. The first group of residents are scheduled to become homeowners next year.

As mentioned, CCSS is planning to build another phase of Tiny Homes next year. This phase consists of seven

more Tiny Homes. Our donation will go toward one of these seven new Tiny Homes.

The Tiny Homes program is only a small part of what CCSS does to help provide food, housing, health & mental health services and jobs programs. Some of you may remember trips to prepare and provide meals at one of their kitchens. Besides the Tiny Homes, CCSS provides both emergency and permanent support housing in a number of apartment buildings near the Tiny Homes community in the broader

CCSS community. CCSS also provides health and mental

Industries is a unit of CCSS that helps provide jobs in a sustainable way. They pick up and sort scrap metal, pick up and shred paper, and use illegally dumped tires as the base material for mud mats and key chains stamped with the Old English D. Another initiative underway is the construction of a car wash near the Tiny Homes community that will use only one cup of water per car and be

staffed by adults with developmental issues. We saw the concrete block superstructure under construction on our tour.

Rev. Fowler is not stopping there. She continues to look for creative ways to advance the goals of CCSS. CCSS has received a grant to allow them to engage a consultant to determine how to establish a no-plastic grocery store in the CCSS community. This combines several of their goals, including green sustainability, promoting self-reliance, and creating a commercial, job-providing corridor in the community.
