Children Belong Here

There is a place for families and children of all ages here! We believe children who worship with their church family stick with their faith for a lifetime. Choose what works best for your family:

- The Prayground in the back of the sanctuary, where children may do quiet activities, with you nearby
 to assist, as they absorb the worship service. Third graders and older are encouraged to sit with their
 family in the pews.
- The Backyard Playroom is a free program offering a safe, indoor environment for children ages five
 (5) and under to play under parental/guardian supervision, and is open Monday, Wednesday, and
 Friday from 9am to 12pm.
- Sunday School: Following the Time with Children, kids may go with Sunday school leaders to class, which ends at the conclusion of the worship service.
- Nursery: Childcare for infants and toddlers during the 10:30am service, with background-checked staff and volunteers.

Finding Your Way

Kirkman Fellowship Hall: Use either staircase in the lobby to go downstairs into the Hall. Nursery: Located to the right of the lobby, down the hallway across from the Sunflowers Preschool classroom. Elevator: Down the hall, left past the Sunflowers Preschool classroom. Restrooms: Women's & Men's are at the top of the short stairwells in the lobby, All Gender/Single in the narthex outside the sanctuary; Accessible is at the end of the hallway near the Fireside Room. Hearing-assist devices: Ushers near the sanctuary doors are available to assist you.

Affirmation of Faith—Adapted from the Confession of 1967, 9.32–33.

One: The life, death, resurrection, and promised coming of Jesus Christ has set the pattern for the church's mission. His human life involves the church in the common life of all people. His service to men and women commits the church to work for every form of human well-being.


One: In the power of the risen Christ and the hope of his coming, the church sees the promise of God's renewal of human life in society and of God's victory over all wrong.

Music Notes

The German Hymn "Punish Me Not in Thy Anger" first appeared in print in 1694. The text is a paraphrase of Psalm 6 by Johann Georg Albinius. The text states: "Lord, do not rebuke me in your anger or discipline me in your wrath. Have mercy on me, Lord, for I am faint; heal me, Lord, for my bones are in agony. My soul is in deep anguish. How long, Lord, how long?" We hear two settings of this tune by two German composers, one by Johann Simon from the late 1700s, the other by Max Reger from 1902.

These stanzas are selected from sixteen that originally made up this paraphrase of Psalm 103, the second of two versions in the volume where they were first published. The tune used here was probably created as a German psalm tune but later came to be used with hymn texts.
