Please don't hesitate to contact me or the church office for more info on any of these events, or if you are in need of pastoral care in these days.


As I think about seeing signs of resurrection each day, these words from Walt Whitman are speaking to me:

FOOD, RENTAL AND UTILITY ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

Many Royal Oak households have experienced loss of employment or significant reduction in income due to COVID-19. Renters may be eligible for free financial assistance



for unpaid rent and/or utilities dating back no more than six months.

The City of Royal Oak has contracted with South Oakland Shelter/Lighthouse of Oakland County, and Legal Aid and Defender Association of Detroit to help keep low- to moderate-income Royal Oak renters from being evicted for non-payment.

Interested parties should contact Legal Aid and Defender Association to inquire about their eligibility for rent or utility assistance.

Additionally, those in need of free food, for a period not to exceed six consecutive months, can discuss opportunities with South Oakland Shelter/Lighthouse.

HENDRIE PARKING LOT UPDATE


The congregation voted to authorize the sale of the Hendrie Blvd. parking lot at the special congregational meeting held on April 10, 2022. This authorization allows the church to move forward with efforts to sell the property to one or more builders or developers to build one or two new homes on that land. Approval to move forward with a sale must also be obtained from the Detroit Presbytery. Our proposal will be presented to the Presbytery's Board of Trustees at its meeting on May 3, 2022, and if approved, it will be presented to the full Presbytery on May 24, 2022. The land will be actively marketed once Presbytery gives its approval.

Information was offered at the congregational meeting about an offer received from a local builder. Unfortunately, that builder decided to back away from that deal. However, we remain optimistic about the ultimate prospects of a sale that will provide substantial benefits to the church.

Kevin Ball, Derek Helenberger, and Keith Weber are the members of the task force overseeing the sale of the Hendrie parking lot. They will be available in the church parlor on May 1 after the 10:30 service to answer questions about selling the parking lot.

Worship and Music

on **Sunday May 22**, our 10:30 am worship will celebrate the Spiritual as well as organ compositions by African American composers. All our soloists will be featured, and the choir will sing several wonderful spiritual arrangements. Organ music that day will be by Black composers and our congregational hymns will include much loved spirituals like "Balm in Gilead" and "Deep River."

The following is a brief history of the Spiritual with thanks to "The Gospel Truth About Negro Spirituals" by Randye Jones and from an article by Pamela Crosby, executive director of Black Methodists for Church Renewal for "The Interpreter" magazine.

Negro spirituals are songs created by the Africans who were captured and brought to the United States to be sold into slavery. This stolen race was deprived of their languages, families, and cultures; yet, their masters could not take away their music. Over the years, these slaves and their descendants adopted Christianity, the religion of their masters. They re-shaped it into a deeply personal way of dealing with the oppression of their enslavement. Their songs reflected the slaves' need to express their new faith.

They told stories, from Genesis to Revelation, with God's faithful as the main characters. They sang about Moses and the Red Sea, the Hebrew children and Joshua and the Battle of Jericho. They could tell you about Mary, Jesus, God, and the Devil. If slaves couldn't read the Bible, they would memorize Biblical stories they heard and translate them into songs.

The songs were also used to communicate with one another without the knowledge of their masters. The lyrics of "Steal Away" alerted slaves that a secret religious meeting would take place that night. An "invisible church" developed as a place where slaves truly could express their concerns. Meeting in the woods or arbors, out of sight of owners and overseers, the slaves were free to worship and praise and to offer unbridles prayers and requests to God. Other "codes" found in the first spirituals related to an escape to a free country. For example, "home" can mean Heaven, but it is also is a safe place where one can live free. "Crossing over Jordan" can mean crossing to heaven or crossing over into freedom. "Wade in the Water" and "Deep River" were used by Harriet Tubman, conductor of the Underground Railroad, to warn slaves to travel in the water to throw off their scent from the bloodhounds.

Spiritual were created extemporaneously and were passed on orally from person to person. These songs were improvised as suited the singers. There is a record of approximately 6,000 spirituals or sorrow songs; however, the use of oral tradition and the prohibition of slaves learning to read or write meant the actual number is unknown.

With the conclusion of the Civil War, and the ratification of the 13th amendment, most former slaves distanced themselves from the music of their captivity. It was through a group of singers from Fisk University in Nashville in the late 1870s, who began to tour to raise money for their financially strapped school, that the performance of spirituals was given a rebirth. The Fisk jubilee Singers not only carried spirituals to parts of the United States that had previously never heard Negro folk songs, the musically trained chorus traveled to Europe and performed for thousands.

In 1916, Harry Burleigh, arranged a plantation melody he heard as a child for voice and piano. "Deep River" is considered to be one of the first spirituals to be written in art song form specifically to be performed by a trained singer. Many great arrangers followed, and in addition to Burleigh there were names like Hall Johnson, Jester Hairston, Moses Hogan, John Work and Brazeal Denard.

Whether in a concert performance, joined in congregational singing, or just singing to oneself, spirituals must be sung with and understanding of what forced such powerful songs to rise up from the souls of the men and women who created them. The unknown creators of these songs may no longer be among us and may never be acknowledged for their work, but their longing for freedom and their abiding faith remain to fill our hearts each time we sing these emotionally charged songs.

Session has approved the opportunity to support an organization doing great work in the area of education at this service. The "Our Own Thing Chorale" was formed by internationally renowned bass/baritone and instructor at the University of Michigan, Willis Patterson. The chorale is committed to the preservation and performance of the Spiritual and contemporary works by African American composers. Through their Instructional Program they also provide free instrumental and vocal instruction to under-privileged children in the Ypsilanti and Ann Arbor area. 
