

From the Pastor's Desk...

Dear friends,

I suspect you, like me, are saying something like this to yourself in these days: "Wow, how is it Advent already? These months just flew by!" The staff like to tease me when I plan our Advent theme during July and our Lenten theme at Christmas. What can I say?! I like to be prepared. So, although our church is always ready for each new season, it still feels like time flies!

This Advent we are asking ourselves, *how does a weary world rejoice?* That line about a weary world rejoicing appears in the Christmas carol, "O Holy Night." The world does feel weary; you don't need me to name the reasons why. And yet people of faith look toward God's hope in the midst of that weariness. Advent



invites us not just into preparation, but also expectation, that God does come to be among us in Jesus Christ. God is at work transforming the world, even now. And so, there is a thrill of hope. We can rejoice!

Like the months before, this season can easily fly by without attending to your inner life or your spirit at all. And I think most of us will regret that if we let it happen to us. So I encourage you to set an intention for this season. What small actions can help you acknowledge your weariness and then lean into hope and joy? What can you do to rejoice in the coming of Jesus this year?

- Light the candles on your Advent wreath, week by week, if you have one at home. Or set up four candles (one to light each Sunday, beginning November 26; any color will do) with one in the center as your Christ candle to light on Christmas Eve.
- Get an Advent calendar at church to look at each day throughout the season. Children's and Anyone versions are available.
- Pick up an Advent devotional booklet at church to dig deeper into our theme and scriptures for this season, as we journey with the gospel of Luke into the story leading up to Jesus' birth.
- Follow our church's social media accounts for periodic posts about Advent that invite you to reflect.
- New research shows that micro-acts of joy, done daily, can increase our sense of wellbeing by 25% over the course of a week. So, engage in a daily micro-act of joy this Advent. Compliment a colleague. Buy an Angel Tree gift or some gloves for the Mitten Tree. Bring cookies to a neighbor. Leave a nice comment online. Enjoy a coffee or hot chocolate and don't work while you drink it.

May you have an Advent that leads you into rejoicing,



Monthly Financial Spotlight

When you work at a church, at some point you will hear someone say they stopped attending services or left their old church because all they talked about was money. In most cases, when that church talked about money, it was in the form of an "ask," bringing money up only when they wanted you to "dig deeper and give a little more." I'll admit, even FPCRO has been culpable of that in the past. However, one of the main reasons churches talk so much about money is because the Bible does so, too. According to Tithe.ly:

- There are more than 2,000 scriptures about money, tithing, and possessions in the Bible
- 16 out of 38 of Jesus' parables deal with money and possessions
- Nearly 25% of Jesus' words deal with biblical stewardship
- 1 out of 10 verses in the Gospels deals with money

In many instances, the scripture is using money to illustrate how to live, give, worship, and serve. My upcoming Financial Spotlights will focus on different pieces of our church's finances and share how that account impacts the mission of FPCRO. It will highlight how we nurture the gifts we receive from God, through our generous donors, and how we use those funds in our ministries to impact the lives of our members and the community.

Interest Income

Interest Income is derived from interest and dividends from our banking and investment accounts. Our investment accounts were funded through donations and legacy gifts from members and friends. By investing these funds until they are needed, we are able to maximize the impact of the gifts of our generous donors.

Fun Facts:

- We rely on our income-earning assets for 11% of our operating income, which is around \$88,250
- Carolyn and Milton Kevreson, former members, donated \$250,000 to FPCRO designated for our Music Ministry. Session invested these funds and uses the income generated to help offset the cost of our Soloists. It generates about \$7,550 each year.
- Interest earned on our Cheek Memorial, Tom & Ruth Kirkman Scholarship, and Pooled Income Funds do not go into our general operating budget but are reinvested in their respective funds.

YouVersion Reviews: A Smartphone Bible App

Technology can be a great tool for our faith! Some people like to say that we always have the Bible at our fingertips as long as we have our phones with us. Seminary Intern Lon Kuehn and member Derek Helenberger have been in conversation about one of their favorite Bible apps for their phones. Below, they each review the **YouVersion** app, and share features that are helpful in learning more about scripture and developing our faith. If you have questions or need help getting the app, feel free to speak to Lon or Derek for assistance.

Android: Derek Helenberger

Having had the YouVersion app for several years, I have been very pleased with it and enjoy its Verse of the Day, which was the first feature I used. With a few taps of my fingers I can easily get to different locations in the Bible. This app also can download versions to my phone's memory so I don't need an Internet connection to use it.



I've downloaded nine versions, including the NRSV, NIV, and the King James version when I am looking for the old-world words. Also, I have The Message downloaded for when I need a more plain-spoken version.

The app has 72 English translations to choose from and the ability to change from one to another with the tap of a finger. Recently I discovered some versions on the app may be played aloud.

To download the app, go to the Google Play store, search "YouVersion" and click the "install" button.

iPhone: Lon Kuehn

For about five years I've been using the YouVersion app, and in addition to the features Derek mentioned, I've enjoyed the Reading Plans. With literally hundreds of Reading Plans available, they cover a variety of topics (love, anxiety, healing, anger, hope, depression, fear, peace, etc.), and vary in length from three days to one year.

To read the Old and New Testaments annually, I like using the Bible in One Year plans. I've completed the Standard Reading plan, the Chronological Order plan (which takes one through the Bible as the events occurred). Currently I'm reading the One Year Original Order Reading plan, which groups the Old Testament books in their original order of the Hebrew Bible. Each plan gives a fresh viewpoint of the Scriptures and allow one to progress through them alone, or invite family and friends to read the plan together. Groups may comment and interact with each other as they read the day's verses.

With so many options in this app it never feels stale or boring—there's always new content to explore and immerse oneself in God's Word.

To download the app on iPhone, simply swipe down on your home screen and type "YouVersion" in the search box, click on the "YouVersion Bible App" link and install.
