From the Pastor's Desk...

Friends,

Recently, I was invited to coffee by Seth Resler, who produced our *Forging Faith* podcast last year. It was fun to catch up with him and hear about his projects in production and radio. Though I thought he was going to pitch me with something new, we just had a great conversation about his work and ours. He is investing in ways to create and build community, particularly through online and inperson events. He is interested in how we do this as the church, and it was interesting for me to hear his take on how much community is needed in the 'secular' world. I came out thinking a lot about our church's role in creating connections among people, and my role in that as pastor.



In one of my seminary classes, we were asked to consider a personal metaphor that illustrated pastoral ministry for us. At that time, fourteen years ago, the metaphor I shared was *drum major*: the one who marches in front of the band to conduct, and who is helping the other members of the band (church members) play their music well. The conversation with Seth led me to think about the question of a metaphor for my ministry in 2024.

Today, I would say a *dinner party host* is a more apt metaphor for the work of a pastor. The kind of host who carefully plans the meal, thinks through the guest list to be invited, and intentionally seats certain people next to one another to ensure great conversation. Then who ultimately opens the door, and begins helping people make connections. This metaphor also reminds me that there is a lot I can do as the pastor/host to prepare and plan for a gathering. But, there is also a lot that is not in my control once people begin to come together. I can invite folks to gather and I can curate an experience for them. But then I must be able to set them free to relate, build relationships, and create something new that goes way beyond me.

I don't think most people clearly state that they are looking for *community*. Even though all of us long for connections, I think most people would not name their longing as such. But when new people do come here, they seem to be looking for a place to be known and to know other people; to feel comfortable in thinking through their problems and those of the world; and to find connections to others and to God that are meaningful. All of those are things are possible to find here in this church community. I believe that when I serve as a good host, I can help people find those authentic connections, ask good questions, and come to trust the people around them.

But I don't think this metaphor is limited to pastors. I think the image of a good host is one for which many people in our church are gifted. As you perhaps host an Easter dinner or attended one recently, I invite you to think about this metaphor, too, and about how you might be called to help people—new and old—build connections in our church.


wants to host an in-person event

Generosity and Resources

A QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTION TO FPCRO FROM YOUR IRA CAN BRING TAX BENEFITS

A qualified charitable distribution (QCD), also known as an IRA charitable rollover gift, allows individuals 70½ or older to make an outright gift of up to \$100,000 from an IRA directly to FPCRO and exclude it from taxable income.

Requirements of a QCD

- The IRA account holder must be age 70 1/2 or older at the time the distribution is made to FPCRO.
- Distributions are limited to \$100,000 per individual per year and must be transferred directly from the IRA custodian to FPCRO.
- Distributions can only be directed from a traditional or Roth IRA (not from a retirement plan such as a 401(k), 403(b), etc.).
- Distributions cannot be made to a donor advised fund or supporting organization (including most private foundations) or used to fund a charitable gift annuity or charitable remainder trust.

No goods, services, or income can be received by the donor in exchange for the gift. Donors should consult their financial adviser, as other requirements may apply.

Benefits of a QCD

- Satisfies all or part of annual required minimum distributions (RMD) and provides a charitable giving strategy for donors who do not need the additional income.
- May be used to fulfill any outstanding pledges.
- Maximizes giving by allowing donors to give outside of the 60 percent of adjusted gross income (AGI) charitable deduction limit.
- Provides value for non-itemizers and donors who live in states that do not allow charitable deductions.
- Minimizes tax liability and can put donors at a lower threshold for Medicare premiums by reducing income.

Donors should work closely with their IRA custodian to request a direct distribution to FPCRO. Please talk to Kari Peruski for more information.



Technology

Technology includes everything from our office computers, software, WiFi, to our live-stream cameras.

Fun Facts:

- Our office hardware is on a rotation replacement schedule to ensure we are working on current equipment. Our server is changed out every five to seven years, and our computers every three years. This enables our ability to run the latest safeguarding software to keep the church network secure.
- We are diligent to make sure any software loaded onto our computers is fully licensed. Many of our licenses are obtained through TechSoup, which offers discounted seats to non-profit organizations.
- During the pandemic in 2021, when we found the best way to resume worship was through live-streaming services and moving to online meetings, the congregation was in full support and contributed \$12,000 to purchase cameras, equipment, and other supplies to make it happen.
- Our IT Department consists of Greg Gillham and Kari Peruski. We partner with Huntington Technology when we run into issues which require more technical knowledge. Greg Gillham has put in hundreds of hours over the years, and our technological platform would not run as smoothly without his time and dedication. We invite you to thank him for his service the next time you see him!
